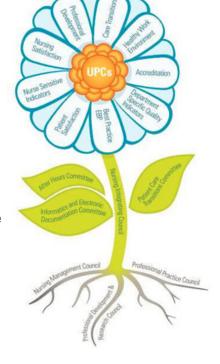

Annual certification goals are set and tracked, and our nurses consistently exceed the target of 51% certified among those eligible.

### Degree Advancement

Goshen Health advances the profession of nursing by supporting nurses pursuing BSN and MSN degrees through tuition reimbursement, loan repayment, and full tuition for select programs. By the end of 2024, 84% of Goshen Hospital nurses held a BSN or higher—surpassing the 80% goal aligned with national standards for high-quality care.

### **RN** Residency

Lisa Helfrich, MSN, RN, NPD-BC, and Michelle Lambright, BSN, RN, lead Goshen Health's Vizient/AACN Nurse Residency Program<sup>™</sup>, a structured 9-month program that supports newly licensed nurses (NLNs) as they transition from classroom to clinical practice.

Monthly sessions led by expert facilitators offer interdisciplinary learning, peer support, and debriefing opportunities. With guidance from mentors and strong peer connections, residents build confidence and competence throughout their first year.

In 2023, 32 NLNs completed the program, followed by 21 in 2024. The program consistently earns high praise from participants and contributes to first-year NLN retention rates above the national average.

#### Clinical Ladder

Goshen Health's Clinical Ladder program supports professional growth, recognizes direct-care nurses, and promotes excellence in practice. Research links such programs to higher satisfaction, better care quality, and improved retention. Since its 2022 launch, nurse retention has increased, with ladder participants showing 4–6% higher retention than non-participants.

Eligibility is based on tenure, degree, and certifications. Nurses voluntarily apply and select a target level each year. Successful participants receive a financial bonus.

Key elements include:

- Advancement based on years of service
- · Recognition for degrees and certifications
- · Credit for precepting, governance, and mentoring
- Support for skill development

### Patient Care Apprentice and Patient Care Extern Programs

#### **Student Nurse Programs**

To support the next generation of nurses, Goshen Health offers paid hands-on learning for sophomore (PCA) and junior (PCE) nursing students. Each student is paired with a preceptor for mentorship, gaining experience with patient care, unit-specific skills, and clinical procedures tailored to their education level.

# Exemplary Professional Practice

### From Annual Skills Days to Competent Observers

Historically, Annual Skills Days were used to assess nursing competency. However, this required nurses to attend a skills day on their days off or find time during their shifts to participate in multi-day competency validation events. In 2023, Clinical Practice Specialists and Professional Development Specialists utilized TUL to redesign the competency validation process.

The new approach introduced Competent Observers—experienced RNs who completed specialized training and had their own skills validated in preparation for their role. Once recognized as Competent Observers, these nurses became resources for Colleagues seeking annual skills validation.

With this method, nurses are assessed in real time, on their units, while providing patient care. Competent Observers directly evaluate their Colleagues' skills, fostering greater confidence and efficiency in the validation process. This new approach officially launched in 2024 and resulted in a first-year cost savings of \$33,600.

# Exemplary Professional Practice

### Ambulatory Care Coordinators Use AI to Balance Caseloads

Led by Kate Shultz, MBA, BSN, NBC-HWC, and Deb Sweetser, BSN, CCM, this innovative project aimed to enhance care coordination and patient outcomes by optimizing nurse care coordinator caseloads through evidence-based practices and Al-generated acuity scoring

The Ambulatory Care Coordination team began with a comprehensive literature review to identify best practices for caseload management. Building on this foundation, they implemented an Al tool to evaluate patient needs and track acuity levels, referral volume, and caseload manageability. By analyzing these data points, the team uncovered clear patterns linking caseload size, patient acuity, and perceived workload.

Their findings revealed that caseloads exceeding 70 patients were consistently associated with lower manageability ratings, which in turn affected the delivery of high-quality care. Through this analysis, the team identified a caseload "sweet spot" that balanced patient volume and acuity—reducing nurse overwhelm, improving job satisfaction, and contributing to fewer avoidable hospitalizations, emergency department visits, and readmissions.

Integrating Al-driven insights into daily practice, this initiative advances our organizational goals by enhancing nursing excellence, promoting patient safety, and supporting sustainable caseload management in ambulatory care settings.

### **TSAM Method Improves Orientation**

Launched in 2023, the Tiered Skills Acquisition Model (TSAM) is an evidence-based orientation framework designed to build nursing competencies through a structured, tiered approach aligned with adult learning principles. TSAM guides new nurses from foundational skills to advanced practice, promoting confidence and clinical growth.

The model has demonstrated success in shortening orientation time, boosting nurse and preceptor satisfaction, and improving retention.

# Interprofessional Collaboration Improves Outcomes for Patients with Chest Pain

Nurses across Goshen Health play a key role in the Chest Pain Center Multidisciplinary Committee (CPCMC)—a collaborative team committed to delivering timely, evidence-based cardiovascular care for patients experiencing chest pain.

The CPCMC includes nurses, physicians, Heart and Vascular Colleagues, lab professionals, and EMS leaders. Together, they review cases, educate staff and the community, and continuously improve processes to ensure rapid recognition and response to heart attack symptoms.

Thanks to this strong collaboration, Goshen Health consistently exceeds national benchmarks:

- Door-to-reperfusion time ≤90 minutes
- Door-to-troponin result ≤60 minutes

These efforts helped Goshen Hospital earn the NCDR Chest Pain–MI Registry Platinum Performance Achievement Award for the 13th consecutive year, placing us in the top 10% of hospitals nationwide for heart attack care. Only 259 hospitals received this honor in 2024.

### Goshen Heart and Vascular Pioneer Innovative Cardiology Procedure

Goshen Heart and Vascular performed one of Indiana's first procedures using a cutting-edge drug-coated balloon (DCB) from Boston Scientific, successfully reopening a coronary artery that had repeatedly clotted despite multiple prior interventions. This rare and complex case underscores our leadership in advanced cardiac care.



The procedure adds to a growing list of innovations at Goshen, where our team routinely utilizes cutting-edge technologies such as drug-eluting stents, Intravascular Ultrasound (IVUS), and Fractional Flow Reserve (FFR) to deliver exceptional outcomes. By pioneering the use of DCBs for in-stent restenosis, Goshen Heart and Vascular continues to set the standard for cardiovascular excellence—bringing the most advanced care to our community.

### Farber Nursing Scholarship

The Goshen Health Division of Nursing offers \$5,000 Farber Scholarships to Colleagues pursuing a nursing career. The Farber Scholarship is named after lifetime Goshen residents Ned and Agda Farber. Ned worked for the U.S. Postal Service and Agda Farber worked at First Federal Savings & Loan, and later at Tower Savings & Loan. #### New Tools for Evidence-Based Practice

Ovid Synthesis is a powerful platform designed to advance evidence-based practice (EBP), quality improvement, and research by fostering a spirit of inquiry across healthcare settings. It offers healthcare professionals streamlined access to literature, expert-guided synthesis tools, and a collaborative online workspace—all aimed at improving patient outcomes through informed decision-making.

In 2024, Goshen Health implemented Ovid Synthesis, thanks to the leadership of Erica Prough, Michelle Lambright and Lisa Helfrich. Collaborating closely with the Ovid team, they customized the platform to align with our nursing resources and The Uncommon Leader (TUL) tools—making it more intuitive, relevant, and impactful for our Colleagues.

Newly licensed nurses in our RN Residency Program were the first to use Ovid Synthesis for their EBP projects. Their positive experience not only enhanced their learning but also laid the foundation for a lasting culture of inquiry, innovation, and evidence-based care at Goshen Health.

### Research Expo

Held in the fall of 2024, the Research Expo offered nursing Colleagues an opportunity to showcase their evidence-based practice projects through engaging poster presentations. Sponsored by the Professional Development and Research Council, the event was designed to foster professional growth and celebrate a spirit of inquiry.
